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CARDOZO H.S. ANNEX UPDATE

There has been a lot of talk about the building being constructed as an extension to Benjamin Cardozo H.S. All we've heard was an announcement in the fall, followed by rumors and 'maybes', no real corroborated information. However, an interview with Principal Meagan Colby sets the facts straight about the upcoming construction project that would change Cardozo in more ways than one.

What Principal Colby knows for sure is that there will be an extension to our high school (already approved by the DOE and School Construction Authority), most likely on the hill at the corner of Springfield Blvd and 58rd Avenue. This project is being pushed by local politicians, such as Councilman Grodenchik, because of how congested all city schools are and the need for more space. According to Principal Colby, we are at approximately 156% capacity.

The building would accommodate approximately 548 seats, but they would not

THE PASSING OF ADRIAN CORNELL

Adrian Cornell died on May 26 in Florida at the age of 100.

No doubt many people living in Bayside Hills today do not recognize his name. But, during the 1970s through the 1990s, Adrian was an extremely active member of the Bayside Hills Civic Association who volunteered countless hours of his time for the betterment of the community.

Adrian was involved in many of the challenges facing the BHCA during those years. He fought the followers of Veronica Lueken who sought to erect a shrine on the grounds of St. Robert Bellarmine Church. He was instrumental in resolving the dispute with BQ Cable over the placement of its wires along the avenues of Bayside Hills. He was a fierce and vocal defender of strict residential zoning laws.

During much of the nine years that I was BHCA President, Adrian served as both Vice President and Chair of the Board of Directors. In some ways Adrian and I were very different. He was retired and more than twice my age when I was first elected President in 1988. Politically, we were polar opposites. But I always respected his commitment to the community. We worked well together and we had some fun while doing it. He and I played "Starsky and Hutch" one evening when we tracked down the hit and run driver who destroyed the Bayside Hills entrance cupola at 48th Avenue. We also partnered undercover with the police to help apprehend a graffiti vandal. Adrian was a proud fiscal conservative. As a result, one of the rare issues on which we disagreed was an increase in BHCA dues. But after he lost that vote, he went right back to working hard for the BHCA.

During my years on the BHCA Board, I was privileged to work closely with Adrian as well as with others who are no longer alive, such as Bill Caulfield, Margaret Battle and Leo Green. Bayside Hills is a better place because of people like them.

be meant to increase our student population.

"What we have been promised and what the neighborhood has been promised, including some of the civic associations and the local community board, is that the purpose [is] ... to alleviate the overcrowding," Principal Colby clarified.

What Colby has been told tentatively, is that the layout of the school would mimic ours, most probably a three-story building with a basement.

Colby also envisions enrichments in all the current programs at Cardozo (dance, Da Vinci, journalism, and law). When asked for input as to what the new building should have, during the meetings with some administrators and UFT (United Federation of Teachers) Representative Dino Sferrazza, she gave several ideas as to how to make our school's programs run more smoothly and become more refined.

She wants to have one floor dedicated to STEM labs for the DaVinci Program, a professional broadcast room for Journalism and Media Studies Program, and the installation of the courtroom for the Law and Humanities Program.

This courtroom would be funded by the half a million dollars we received in last year's participatory budget. The other enhancements would be partially paid for by the million dollars we were endowed with last summer from the Borough President's office.

"In terms of the dance program, since we would have new [science] labs in the new building, I would like to repurpose current outdated lab space in the main building into additional dance studio space."

Principal Colby has also suggested that there be a pool built in the basement of the new building, for our swim team to practice in and possible electives that students could take in regards to building swimming skills.

Students would take classes in both buildings, prompting the question of whether or not there would be a covered walkway between both buildings. The structure is uncertain and would be decided upon in the later planning stages of this project.

What Colby wants to assert is that all of these plans are very tentative and haven't been approved as of yet. All that is certain right now is that an annex is being constructed, to give the school additional facilities and enhance students learning experience.

Currently there are 3,744 students enrolled at Cardozo HS. This is 156% of of the school's capacity. To alleviate this overcrowding condition at the school the School Construction Authority is proposing to build an additional building. The proposal is for the building to be constructed at the south west corner of Cardozo HS property on 58 Ave abutting Springfield Boulevard. The building will provide an additional 548 seats, a moot court and other amenities. The time frame for this project would be to have a design ready in 1 year. 5 Million dollars has been allocated for this phase. After a design has been completed the project would be sent to bid and a contract awarded. It is estimated that completion of the project would be 3 years after the contract is awarded. This extension is to accommodate the current school population and there is no consideration that the enrollment will be increased.

A new addition to Cardozo HS would be a good thing. The Bayside Hills Civic association is concerned about the over enrollment situation at Benjamin N Cardozo HS. Something must be done to accommodate these students and the Department of Education should not be overpopulating Cardozo HS. The number of students at Cardozo HS needs to be reduced, even if an addition is built. Enrollment priority should be given to students who reside within the school zone.

Further, the Civic Association is concerned that the construction should not interfere with or inconvenience the lives of residents living in the vicinity of the school property, traffic along Springfield Boulevard and the surrounding streets not be affected, careful consideration be given to storm water drainage from the new building so that there will not be a recurrence of the flooding conditions that occurred in the vicinity of 56th Ave. and Springfield Blvd, and that the student population not be expanded especially by students from outside the district

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
